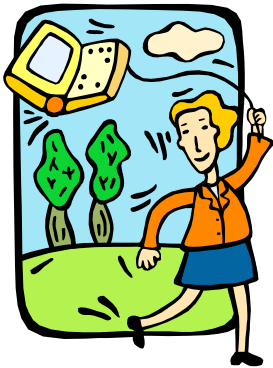

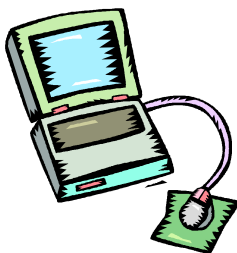

Installation Procedures for Windows XP Service Pack 2

My recommendations are based on using a CD for installing SP2. I would generally assume the same for installing based on Windows' Update, but I have no experience on that track.

- 1) Back up critical items. Making a copy of the registry and activation database would be a good idea.
- 2) Make certain you have 1.6 GB free drive space on your C: drive. If you have less than 1.6 GB, free up space or go buy a larger drive. While the update only takes about 450MB when complete, it requires 1.6 GB workspace during the update process.
- 3) Fire up system, disconnect from Internet.
- 4) Close down ALL tasks - everything non-essential in the system tray, as well. For this purpose, antivirus and firewall products are non-essential (remember, you're not connected to the outside world).
- 5) Start the update by double-clicking on the .exe file downloaded. (The networkdownload version is 266 MB).
- 6) Sit back and relax. It takes about 30 to 45 minutes to perform the update. At the end, the computer will have to restart, at that time you can reconnect the outside world. The major new "feature" will be the improved firewall and all-new Windows Security Center. If you're using up-to-date antivirus system, all should be well. If you already use a software firewall, be sure to access Security Center and shut down the Windows firewall (Security Center is in Start->Programs->Accessories->System Tools); using two firewalls is not recommended. XP Pro systems update much quicker than XP Home systems, at least based on the dozen or so units I've upgraded so far.

Microsoft Warns on Spyware's Impact

all about protecting systems from worms, viruses and spyware, it can't do much about what's already on computers — and that could pose a problem.

The company is warning users of the Windows XP ([news](#) - [web sites](#)) operating system to check for spyware before downloading the free massive security update, called Service Pack 2. Barry Goff, a group product manager at Microsoft, said some spyware could cause computers to freeze up upon installation of the update.

Spyware, which typically piggybacks with downloaded software such as file-sharing programs, tracks behavior, triggers pop-up ads and can otherwise cause problems on computers.

Programs such as Ad-Aware and SpySweeper can scour computers for spyware. Microsoft recommends that users clean their PCs of spyware and back up their data before turning on the auto update feature that automatically downloads Service Pack 2, or SP2.

People who download SP2 also may need to check whether legitimate programs, such as third-party security software, need to be updated. SP2 makes major changes, including adding a Windows Firewall to better guard computers against attack, and those changes can also cause compatibility issues with other software.

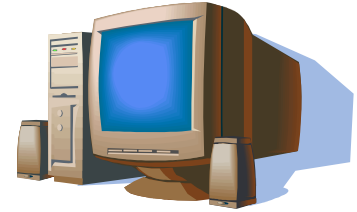
Microsoft finished work on SP2 in early August and is slowly distributing it to customers through automatic downloads, manual downloads and CDs. The company is metering out the product to avoid clogging up networks and slowing other Internet traffic — and to monitor for any glitches.

Goff said fewer than 10 million consumers have received SP2, while several million businesses have downloaded the product.

Research firm IDC estimates that about 260 million copies of Windows XP have been sold.

PowerTools for PowerUsers - Part 1: Alternate Browsers

"How did you find that so fast?"

It's a question I often hear. Part of the ability to find information quickly is due to experience. Part is also provided by the tools I use. The foremost power tool for the power user is a web browser.

[Warning: strong opinions follow. Not for the squeamish, or the Microsoft apologists!]

Most users use Internet Explorer (IE). They use it because it's "free." I put quotes around the "Free" since we will explore later the costs associated with this "free" software, which are substantial. IE exists in several major versions, most notably 5.5 and 6.0, and has been packaged as a part of Windows since WinNT 4.0 in 1996.

IE taxes the user in a number of ways. Foremost is the introduction of virus, trojan and worm infections. The design of IE is responsible for this. Outlook and Outlook Express, Microsoft's email client packages, use IE to perform many mail functions; it is the underlying flaws of IE which expose the unwary user to most infections. Additionally, spyware is almost totally an IE phenomenon, as are

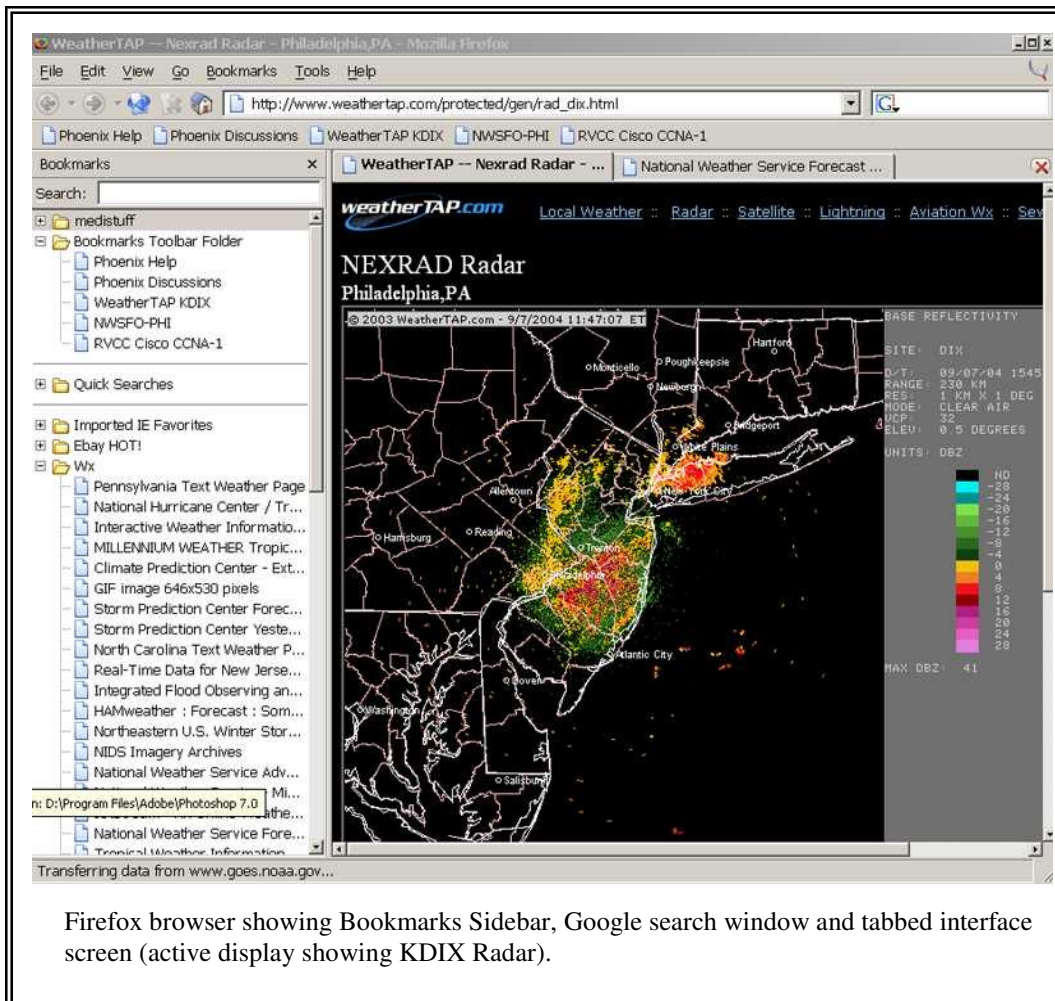
popup advertising windows.

So what is the user to do? Simple. Switch to a stable browser package. For most users this means a choice of four products: Firefox, Mozilla, Netscape and Opera.

Firefox is my choice as top-dog

include a vast array of "skins" to change the browser's appearance, to over 100 different search engines which can be attached to the search box (I have Google, IMDB, eBay, AltaVista and the Cambridge American Dictionary), and additional tools for security and other purposes.

Mozilla is an adequate choice for those who desire full product integration - Mozilla includes an email client and web-page editor applications. The search feature is implemented as a button on the address bar, and tabs and sidebars are available. Popup blocking is standard. Mozilla is also FREE; download from

browser. Firefox is fast, compact, bug-free (I've had one crash in over a year, that when 21 tabs were open!) and includes a wonderful feature: a built-in Google search box right at the top of the browser. Combined with the Tab and Sidebar navigational aids, there is little to complain about with Firefox. Popup blocking is automatic in Firefox though there is a way to turn popups back on (apparently for masochists). Firefox is also FREE; download from <http://www.mozilla.org/> (follow links for Firefox). There are substantial customizations available for Firefox which

Netscape is the direct parent to the Mozilla product; however Netscape has followed a somewhat different development path, often to make the product a bit more useful to AOL users. Features are about the same as Mozilla.

Opera is an acquired taste, a commercial browser product from Scandinavia with obtuse documentation, incessant demands for money, constant self-

These are the notes I made on the q and a section of the HCC Meeting, Sat. Aug 21, 2004. ~ ilene

HCC- Aug. 21, 2004 - "Q and A talk" Lon Hosford talks a lot about his Toshiba laptop. He said PC World had Toshiba and Hewlett-Packard laptop

reviews when he purchased his Toshiba laptop. He admired how the Toshiba sat beside his desktop. Then one day it would not work. Usually the 'idiot lights' for the CD-Rom/ DVD player flutters (I believe he said, 'dust burning'). However, the Toshiba just sat there! But he had the Toshiba 30-day warranty. HCC- AUG 21, 2004 Program: "Yahoo on the Mend" By John Gbur John Gbur commented that he did not know Yahoo was broken. He said, 'on the mend' was Don Colombo's idea. The Freecycle Network is a project of RISE, Inc., a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization whose mission includes reducing waste, generating employment training, and fostering cooperation between other nonprofit organizations and the public.

RISE started the Freecycle Network in May 2003 to promote waste reduction in Tucson's downtown and help save desert landscape from being taken over by landfills. Freecycle provides individuals and non-profits an electronic forum to "recycle" unwanted items. One person's trash can truly be another's treasure!

How does Freecycling work?

One rule: everything posted must be free. Whether it's a chair, a fax machine, piano, or an old door to be given away, it can be posted on the network. Or, maybe you're looking to acquire something yourself? Respond to the posting directly and you just might get it. After that it is up to the giver to set up a pickup time for passing on the treasure.

Non-profit organizations also benefit from the Freecycle Network. Post the item or items you want to give away and a local organization can help you get it to someone in need.
