

## THE MARCH MEETING

The regular meeting of HCC was held at the Hunterdon Medical Center on Saturday, March 18, 2000. Vice President Joe Burger called the meeting to order at 9:30 A.M. About 50 people were present. Guests welcomed included Jim Talbot, Shirley Kent, Blessed Cannata, Glenn Gilbert and Bruce Schontz.

Elaine Simberg and Jim Russ took care of the tickets. Doris and Bill Moore handled the bagels and coffee.

Joe announced that the new domain name for the club web site is now in use: hunterdoncomputerclub.org

Jac Carroll reported a balance of \$796.98

Webmaster Paul Glattstein said you

can still link from the old page address. He is doing some redesigning but still not including any graphics to slow down the loading.

Membership Chairman Don Colombo reported on renewal memberships, one undecided and one gone to Texas.

The Q and A session started with a request for help with MAC instruction. The only help offered was that there is a MAC club at Voorhees HS on second Saturdays 9-12 AM, and Rick Williams' club in Princeton.

Don Colombo asked if he could write messages in **Outlook** then send them in **Hot Mail**. Robert Simmonds explained that properties are defined by the provider and you cannot overlay your choice on theirs. John Warsinski put it another way: You are operating under their system so you can't run your own. People mentioned **MailCity** as another free e-mail program. **Hot mail** is secure.

Judi Weinstein asked for advice on buying a new printer. Jim Russ answered in detail. For more about printers and ink look for CHEAP INK on another page. Ink supplies range from a single cartridge for all the colors to a machine that holds 1 black and 6 colors, all separate. (For some machines you can buy tanks that fit into the cartridge. For others you buy the entire cartridge.) Jim explained that printers are cheap, with manufacturers making their money from ink. John Warsinski said no one should pay more than \$129.95 for a printer. Check for rebates. Machines can share a printer, using a switch box.


Someone asked about problems with paper pick up. Answers: Hewlett Packard sells cleaner that will clean off the slippery buildup without hurting the rollers. Scratching rollers gently with emery board will clean them enough to pick up paper.

Ken Jones mentioned USB – Universal Serial Bus. Joe Burger said he has two serial ports, one for his printer, and one for his wife's.

It was confirmed that the ALPS printers is no longer being made. Ink is still available.

Joe Burger's tech report started with news of Intel making a 1 GHS processor which will only run on machines with the Intel chip set, to be available at the end of the year. Itanium chips will also be out then. IBM will market a 100Gig hard drive in 2002 for \$150.

Joe described software that will run the toaster, coffe pot, refrigerator, electric blanket, etc. and will call the service man when needed. (You still have to wait at home for him through all the hours he fails to come.)

## THE PROGRAM-

## Members' Forum in three parts 1. Panorama Graphics by Peter Czerwinski


Peter set up a tripod to make it clear that this is not a casual operation. He had seen a friend take a series of pictures, then tape them together to show a 360 degree panorama, and found a better way. He uses Live Picture Viewer, downloadable.. and Photo Vista \$60. Photo Vista merges the individual photos. It is very difficult to get the right pictures with a hand held camera. Each picture needs to be at the same level, if the final product is to make sense. Check the level indicator bubble on the tripod. For the first picture, choose a point of reference such as a tree, as a start and finish point. As you take each picture, overlap about one third, so that the right side of one and the left side of the next actually have the same image. You need 13 to 16 pictures for a 360 degree pan. The last picture should almost entirely duplicate the first. The result is a monitor image, not printed. These pictures would be very useful for real esatate presentations. You can make a slide show of one panorama after another.

If the light changes your pictures will of course not match, and you might try taking some the next day. For thousands of dollars you can buy a camera that will take 360 degrees at once. Talk to Peter for details of cameras he uses.

Each photo makes a file of 55 Kb.

Peter showed the series of pictures, with space between each pair. Then he explained that Photo Vista stitches them together, overlapping the duplicate areas, and matching colors. The result is completely seamless. Reality Studio is an alternate program to Photo Vista, for \$130. You can add sound.

Paul Glattstein will post information about Peter's presentation on the club web pages. Thanks to Peter for a lot of new ideas and clear explanation. Before you try this at home it would help to buy a lovely country property, develop it for thirty years or so, clean it all up, mend the fences, trim the bushes, mow the grass, tell the dogs not to run, then set up your tripod.



## 2. RCN by Bill Dearborn

Bill explained that RCN is a spinoff of Commonwealth Phone. He would like to talk with any member who has had a problem with RCN, as reported in an earlier newsletter. Here are some excerpts from a feature article Bill sent.

" Seven years ago, David McCourt came to Princeton from his native Boston, a successful entrepreneur with grand ideas for a small, local cable company... McCourt is at helm of RCN Corp., a West Windsor company with a muted presence at Carnegie Center and a small web of cable customers in the Princeton region.

" For many local residents, RCN seemed to explode into the public eye in recent weeks with the news that the company plans to build a massive office park in the Trenton area. But in the industry, RCN has been attracting attention for some time.

"... RCN is in the midst of building its own fiber-optic network in 49 markets on the East and West coasts. " Already, residents in the Boston, New York, Philadelphia, San Francisco and Washington areas can look to RCN for one-stop, one-price shopping for cable television, telephone and Internet service. " While RCN is the cable television provider in Princeton Borough and Township, Montgomery and Rocky Hill and parts of Hunterdon County, McCourt, a Hopewell Township resident, says it's not surprising that locally the company is relatively unknown.

"Most of what we're doing is not in our home area and to be honest, while we'll offer our full array of services here because it's our home, this area and much of New Jersey really doesn't fit with what we're doing or what our strategy is," he said.


The exception to that is RCN's plan to offer service in Hoboken and Jersey City, which have 90,000 homes.

"There is high density there, but for much of New Jersey, including Princeton, the homes here are too far apart for what we want to do," McCourt said. "As a result we have not been very active locally."

RCN is looking at a choice of 3 large tracts in the Trenton area to build on for corporate headquarters. "...We've been hiring at a rate of about to 15 people a day at this point," said Michael Adams, RCN's president and chief operating officer.

The company currently has 3,800 employees, with about 600 based in West Windsor.

"What we expect is that we will become a major employer in this region and in the markets we are going into," said Timothy Stoklosa, RCN's chief financial officer. "Based on the growth we're experiencing I would expect that 10 years from now we'll have 20,000 employees."



3. CD ROM Burners by Perry Snyder

Perry is a computer veteran who dwells in realms of gold far above many of us. You will need to ask him for details, if you are in the group that still confuses a CD with the deceptively similarly sized obsolete 5 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> floppy disk. Herewith some points from my notes, and some quotes from his handout. To burn a CD means to put data or music on a writable CDROM disk in a special drive. After the disk is created, or burned, you can play it back from an ordinary CD drive. Cautions on installation: Install the burner as a Master on the Secondary IDE channel, connect the CD ROM reader to the Primary Slave IDE channel.

Windows 98 is much better at recognizing cdrom burner drives than Windows 95. (Ed.: It is because of this fact that your newsletter is disrupted by a month of down time on the major machine. There was a conflict between the CD Write drive and the Iomega Zip 250 drive)

Uses of a CD Burner include backing up large amounts of data, backing up music CD's, distributing company data, backing up new software, creating custom music CD's (copying commercial music from several sources onto one disk with just your favorites.)

Software packages noted: CD Burning, Adaptec Easy CD Creator, Ahead Nero Rom Burning, CD Right!, Blind Read, and Fireburner.

Hard Drive Utilities: Norton Ghost,, Partition Magic, Drive Image. Music Software: Audio Catalyst, Audio Grabber, CD Ex, WinAmp, Freeamp, LAME encoder, Fraunhofer MP3 Codec, Sound Forge 4.5

CD's to burn come in 2 flavors, CD R on which you can only write, and the more expensive CD R/W's that are supposed to be re useable .Perry says they can be reused about 3 times.

To copy a complete CD to one of your own, it is better to copy the whole thing to your hard drive, then copy it to the new CD. In order to copy directly from the burner drive to the ordinary CD drive both drivesmust be in perfect sync, which is unlikely.

Perry's glossary:

SCSI -small computer system interface pronounced scuzzy Eide Ide – Integrated Device Electronics Primary ide channel Tao - track at once DAO – disk at once "gets more data on disk" MS DOS 8.3 file name ISO 9660- an international format standard for CD-ROM, adopted by the International Organization for Standardization Joliet – "supports long file names" WAV – a sound file

"Visit the web site: **www.ahead.com** Ahead produces a software package called "**Nero**". It has a page which lists the bus type, DAO, and overburn abilities of many cd roms. This information never seems to be mentioned in the review articles of major computer magazines."

Norton **Ghost** copies your hard drive to a CD to use to restore in case of disaster, but only on the same system. This is not a way to move everything from your old computer to a new one.

## Catching e-mail addresses

Someone mentioned at the March meeting that it is possible to record the address on an incoming message, to add to your address book. In Outlook Express, the way to do this is : Click on the message. With the message open, click on Tools. On the Tools menu click Add to address book. On the side menu click on Sender. Done.

## CHEAP INK

At the March meeting Jim explained in detail low prices of printers tied to high prices for ink. He pointed out that some printers have one cartridge only, so that when one color is gone, you need a new cartridge . . ( Ed: unless you want to use up the remaining colors on unimportant printing where strange colors are ok.)Other printers have separate black and color tanks and give you a choice of which to install, and let you switch cartridges (Ed: On some printers you are warned not to replace a cartridge once removed. On some it is so hard to get the cartridge in right that removing it is dangerous.)\_ Still other printers let you choose to print color or black but require both cartridges to be in place and functional before either will work. Below are some URL's which offer low cost ink.

If your phone bill lists numbers you don't recognize, go to www.anywho. com. Click on Reverse Lookup. Type the mystery number, copying space and hyphen as on your bill. I tried two numbers, with 50% success, and suggested to the failed one that he list himself. Having found the name that goes with the number, it's still your problem to try to remember why in the world you called them.

Following is *Secret Guide* Author Russ Walter's comment:

Most of the free Internet phone directories contain outdated info. They still think I'm in Somerville MA, even though I moved to New Hampshire 15 months ago.

The directories are produced by waiting for printed phone directories to be printed, then either scanning them in (with a scanner) or hiring cheap typists in China to type it all, then waiting for somebody to get around to uploading the new data to the Web site. The directories are typically a year out of date -- and also full of errors.

Besides www.anywho.com, you can also look at www.infousa.com (which provides data to most other sources), www.411.com (which works the fastest), www.switchboard.com, www. infospace.com, and www.555-1212.com (which submits your request to several other search engines).

Each service is quick to remind you that if you pay a high fee, they'll give you the CORRECT data for anybody by sleuthing.




