Maureen thanked Doris Moore for welcoming guests. A voice from the rear announced the upcoming Ken Gordon show at Edison August 26 and 27. Maureen asked members to update information for the membership booklet.

Maureen asked for volunteer presenters on any of the following topics: CAD, Scanners, DTP, BBS's, networking, WWW, multimedia, Faxing, Newsletter, programming, DOS6.22, configuring a new machine, multiple configurations, offline readers, modems, document management and retrieval. Some presentations might involve a panel of new vs experienced users, or young vs old, or pro and con a particular program

David Nowotnik volunteered for the WWW topic. Bob Springer sprang for October and Fax procedures. In November the Ewing club joins us, bringing a program by Broderbund. In December we have a party and talk about computers. Janice Latella volunteered for basic DTP, and the newsletter editor volunteered for the obvious.

Bill Woodall remains in his post as Program Director, with the last word on topics, presenters, and scheduling, but no longer doing most of the programs himself. Maureen awaits volunteers for 1996 meetings.

Treasurer Jac Carroll reported a balance of \$1516.84. He was pleased to note that several new young callers have been using MMW lately.

Librarian Art Gerke had no report.

Computer Volunteers A new plan to recruit teachers for the Senior classes involves inviting graduates to work as teacher aides this semester, with an eye to taking classes of their own next semester (February '96.) 8 people have agreed to start this program, with a faculty meeting on Sept 1 and orientation for incoming freshmen on Sept. 8

Bob Springer added that the lessons have been written, and tested, and are available on disk (Word6) so that a new teacher does not have to create the course. He reminded members that teaching is the greatest way to learn, and that helping others makes you feel good, and urged people to volunteer.

Phil Stonesifer and John Warsinski expressed interest in teaching after they retire in February.

Maureen suggested many people would like to help if they could do it evenings. Evelyn explained that seniors don't want to drive at night.

Newsletter Editor - Offered thanks to the increasing number of contributors. Please send or upload notes for columns of favorite WWW addresses, and notes on your early days in computing.

Maureen called on Erich Reinecker for details about **ECLIPSE**, the long awaited local Internet access provider. Erich said the next two sites in Hunterdon are awaiting decision on rates by UTC. **ECLIPSE** will charge \$33./month. for 100 hours of full access to the Internet. He explained that the government now funds only about 5% of Net costs, and will end funding this year. There was a comment that it is a misconception to think of the Internet as a service run by one group. There is no "membership", and no company that runs it.

After the program Alan Nass concluded another successful sales campaign with a gift to Bill Hannula, and raffled door prizes donated by Erich Reinecker, of Internet packages, and a box of Windows 95 information do-

nated by Anthony Versarge.

Maureen introduced the speaker, who has been a member for two years, and is about to be a junior at North Hunterdon.

THE PROGRAM

Anthony Versarge does Windows 95

In a flawlessly prepared presentation, with clear and confident delivery, Anthony Versarge took us through Windows 95, not just listing features, but showing it in use. He and his retinue had the system set up and ready on time, and kept everything moving without a single glitch. He sent his brother around with handouts of demo disks, a choice of CD or 3.5, and flyers from Microsoft.

Start replaces Program Manager. A bar at the bottom shows all open programs, so you can move among them without using Alt-Tab or Control Escape. Anthony moved a graph from Excel into Word without pain. Global search for any text in a file has been added. Help has been made simpler. For printer installation you get step by step instructions, and a button to start the process. Long file names are allowed, and may include spaces. Longer extension are also allowed, but your current WORD program will not read them. The new recycle bin parallels the Mac Trash Can. Deleted files stay in the bin until you take a further step to empty it. You can delete a file with drag and drop. You set a limit of what the trash can will hold. At that limit it automatically empties. Win95 shows Properties of a great many items.

You can drag and drop files to START if you want them at opening. Recovery from hangups is much improved over 3.1. Memory management is much better. Anthony showed 65% of resources still available, with 6 copies of Word6 loaded. He said that he had not used WIN 3.11 but that in 3.1 his system regularly crashed if he had 4 programs open.

Anthony uses a 486DX 50 with 16 MB RAM and 340 MB hard drive. (This

caused groans of envy when he was first introduced two years ago. Now he plans to get a 1.2 gigabyte hard drive. He recommends doubling all of Microsoft's hardware suggestions, if you want WIN95 to run smoothly.

He finds Win95 more stable than 3.1. He recommends getting WIN95 on CDRom instead of the thirteen floppies. 95 installed over 3.1 with no problem, in about 1 hour and 20 minutes.

Explorer replaces the File Manager, but all previous functions still work.

Hardware installation is much simpler. Plug in the new component and WIN95 identifies it for you., and tells you where it is.

Anthony noted that you must use the shutdown procedure to end each session. Bill Woodall added that if files are open when you turn off the machine, Scan-Disk will run for about an hour the next time you boot, and you have no choice about this.

MS DOS programs will run and DOOM will run with WIN95, but not 3.1 In WIN95 you can copy from DOS to Windows.

There is a built in uninstaller, and a font preview and print out feature, and a built in joy stick driver. In 3.1 each game has to support its own joystick.

This is far from a complete report. Anthony has set a high standard for the rest of us and proved once again that great presenters are right here in the group, waiting to be discovered.



AUGUST Q & A

Q: How do you Fax from Windows for Work Groups?

A: Set up a Post Office in MS Mail or WinFax Lite or WinFax Pro.

Q: What about turning off the computer?

A: Woody's perennial answer is that he leaves his on all the time, but turns off monitors. People agree about leaving it on if you plan to use it again in an hour or so. A recent article said don't turn it on more than 3 times a day. People agree that turning on is stressful for the in'ards. If you don't have a BIG (as in Zero-Surge) power surge protector, unplug the whole system during lightning.

Q: How do you get rid of a swap file message that comes up before Windows ?

A: Delete the swap file. (Woody's repeated advice: When in doubt, don't delete, but move the file to a floppy. If everything is still working after three weeks, then delete it.) You might keep such a disk in a File Management section of a drawer.

The first message you should see is "Looking up host: www.wp.com" Followed by "Contacting host:www.wp.com", then a change to "Connected: waiting for reply". CIFS often freezes at the very first message - their DNS needs serious upgrading.

If it freezes at the second prompt (Contacting) - then the problem could be at www.wp.com - 2100 PDT could be a bad time for that server.

INTUIT BRINGS IT HOME - A REVIEW

It's ironic, given my lackluster financial history, that I would be given the opportunity to review a personal finance program.

Installation of the program was absolutely painless. I wish installing *games* could be as easy.

The features I liked the best revolved around the Financial Planners. Let's say I won the lottery. Okay, "I won the lottery.". With the Financial Planners, I could plan my retirement and forecast what my savings account would look like on April 1st, 2004. I probably wouldn't have much use for the Loan Planner at that point unless, of course, I needed to lend someone \$25,000 over a 10 year period at 7.3% annually. Then I could determine what the monthly payment should be (\$294.15!).

The Forecasting Planner helps you define different financial scenarios and then

draws a graph describing the subsequent outcome over a predetermined time period. I found that if my only income were through unemployment compensation, and my present expenses remained unchanged, I would have a *negative* balance by the end of next month! I was also able to compare brighter financial scenarios, and carry the figures over to other functions in Quicken with ease.

I can't wait to use the *Tax Planner* to help me with my 1995 taxes! The Tax Planner also let's you diddle with various tax situations. What would your taxes be like if you got that *Big Raise* this year? What if you were single... *and* got the big raise? When it's time to actually do your taxes, open the Tax Planner, and push the button that imports all tax related items from your accounts. Then, look at that Refund!

Everyday functions are a breeze. If you have a number of recurring transactions, you can assign a button on the toolbar to each one. Click. Done. It's easy to set up special accounts for credit cards, or tracking frequent flier miles.

Quicken Deluxe for Windows comes with a great little program called Quicken Home Inventory. This is another easy to use program that's just as flexible as the other Quicken functions.

You can use this for alot of things besides the obvious. Use Home Inventory to create a shopping list, track your CD collection, track insurance policies, inventory all that expensive landscaping you've invested in, and check out the category called Emergency Supplies.

Quicken Deluxe for Windows also has online features such as Quicken Quotes. You can have stock prices downloaded automatically on any day at any time. You decide when.

The manuals that come with this program are actually pretty clear and accurate. The latter descriptor often being overlooked by the company publishing such texts, Intuit does a pretty good job of bringing the intricacies of personal finance to a level where the home user will benefit most: Home.

WOODY EXPLAINS ISP (INTERNET SERVICE PROVIDER) COSTS, ON MMW: with reference to ECLIPSE pricing

A personal user who needs more than 100 hours a month has got a severe problem, or is trying to operate commercially at personal rates. My Internet activity is primarily business-related; after four months of PPP service I expect I could live at a 100 hour limit quite comfortably (my aggregate for four months is 158 hours).

From an economic standpoint, I'm amazed at the \$95 rate - (for unlimited hours) - should be around \$200 according to calculation. The more you're on, the more you hog the port. And therefore, they'll need additional ports to service others. Now, figuring \$8/month per pots line inbound, about \$400 each for modems (can't use consumer grade stuff for this), about \$7500 for a terminal server/brouer combo (need one for every 48 lines), \$2000/month for the T1 feed...

After working on it in several directions, I come to the same set of conclusions every time: Services offering unlimited PPP access for less than \$30/month aren't going to be around for very long, without other

sources of revenue. In the next 18 months I expect a number of the ISPs will be gone, or charging substantially higher rates. Don't expect telco deregulation to help the residential user - when the regs go away, so will unlimited free calling.

In all their written information, Eclipse places a limit of 100MB/month transfer on web pages. I'll ask for a clarification on that.

QUICKEN: - A SECOND VIEW - A REVIEW BY PETER BARONE

Alright, I admit that I was not a real **Quicken** fan. I had been keeping track of my finances with a spreadsheet, and was not disappointed with the results. True I had to do the graphs manually and create my own reports but I felt I was in total control. So much for that.

My first experience with **Quicken** was

ver 3. I got it when I bought TurboTax (heck , the bundle price was hard to turn down). I was disappointed that I could find no way to import the 5 years of data I had in the spread sheet, but I continued on, logging each check in. Not surprising I found the information to be ultimately more usable in **Quicken**. Nice canned reports, good graphs and a not unpleasant interface with me (it looks like a check register). It memorizes check information so I don't have to put it in again, you can select the check info from a list. If I tell it my regular bills and when they come due, the billminder will remind me that there are bills to pay when I turn on my computer. I can put in different accounts (like checking, savings, investment and credit cards) and use some or all of them in the reports. I think I can handle this.

So now comes the CD ROM. I an a big fan of the CD, as it holds LARGE amounts of data and doesn't take up room on the hard drive. And when it comes to installing software, it heralds the end of the "feed me disks" era. Just insert 1 disk and you're done (now if they would only ask all the questions up front I could just walk away). So I guess I'll upgrade and see what happens.

Seem it is a flawless installation. It found my old data and I'm up and running. Now I'll nose around and see what's new.

First there is the Intuit Marketplace. Hmmm, it seems like they want me to spend more money from right here in front of my computer. Just a few clicks of the mouse and I can empty my bank account. They do offer all sorts of supplies for Quicken like checks , envelopes, etc. as well as other Intuit software. Maybe I'll check this out later.

I wonder what else is new?

There is something called the Quicken Financial Suite. I think I'll click on that and see what happens. Hmmm, I can choose Library, Home Office or Ask the Experts. I think I'll see what the experts have to say.

Now this is what multimedia CD's are all

about. There are these two people on the screen and they talk to me about whatever question I pick. All right!!

I wonder what's in the library

Hey there are books here (well what did you expect). Some help books , some stock market books and a home inventory book. The home inventory wants me to tell it all the stuff I have so I can keep track of it. Maybe later, now I want to check out the stock market

Wow, there is a bunch of information on a bunch of stocks on this CD. Let's see how Microsoft is doing. WOW lots of charts and graphs. It says their 52 week average is 59.25. They have a beta of 1.21. When I think of Microsoft and beta I think of Windows 95, but I know that is not the beta being quoted. I'll just ask help to find beta. Hmmm there is no entry for beta. I guess if you gotta ask then this part is not for you.

All that's left is the Home Office. I'll see what gives there.

Home Office seems to be another interface to much of the same information (help files, document files and **Quicken** itself). There is a phone on the desk marked "Quicken Quotes". I'll just click that and see what happens.

Well whatdoya know. If the historical data on the CD isn't current enough for me and I set this up right it appears that I can call out via modem and get current pricing on different stocks. Pretty handy if I didn't spend all my money on computer stuff.

Well that's my story. I find **Quicken** to be a versatile asset in my financial tool room. I must report a problem that did occur after the installation. The buttons that allow you to navigate through the various help files (forward, back exit, help, etc.) did not appear on my screen and since I didn't know they were there I didn't know they weren't there. I did know that navigating through the help systems was tedious and cumbersome. I noticed there were "boxes" around the screen and became suspicious so I left a message in the Quicken

forum on Compuserve (thank goodness for support forums). I received a reply from someone who went out of his way to tell me he was NOT with Intuit. His advice (which did work) was to remove the newer version of MVIEWER2.EXE and replace it with the older one on the **Quicken** disk. How do people find these thing out?

My advice is that if you are intending to use financial software, **Quicken** is one of the best (Bill Gates agrees with me on this point). If you are setting it up you would be wise to spend some time thinking about the categories you set up for your checks as they are how some of your best reports are done. If you know someone who uses **Quicken** who you don't mind discussing your finances with, invite them over for help. But don't worry because I have yet to find anything that is not changeable at a later date.



VIRUS DIR.BYWAY

DESTRUCTIVE**

Liz Dunbar sent a printout of NASA Bulletin 95-23 of 8/11/95, of "a recently announced security vulnerability". The entire document is 3 pages long. Copies will be ready for the September meeting. Note that the fix calls for booting from a system disk. Have you made yours yet? Remember that Woody tells us you can't get a virus until you run an infected program, and we have repeatedly been told to virus-check every new disk or down-loaded file we use. Excerpts of the NASA bulletin follow.

Dir. Byway, a variant strain of the DIR viruses, will trigger in 1996 for systems that have not taken appropriate eradication measures. The Dir.Byway virus is both a stealth and a polymorphic program, which means it is difficult to detect once loaded into memory, and will mutate and propagate itself until memory is cleared. The virus attacks a disk cluster and uses this cluster to cross-link to each .COM or .EXE file it infected.

"When triggered, the virus displays the message "Trabajameoms Todos Por Venezuela". (We are all working for Venezuela) On multi-media machines.... the message is accompanied by music resembling Venezuela's national anthem.

" Currently, there is concern only with the eradication of the virus due to its future trigger date. The virus will still propagate presently and should be viewed as an immediate threat..... The solution is to copy all of the NON-.EXE and NON-.COM files to a backup. ...The data files that should be backed up are word-processing files, data files, image files, as well as any non-executable file.. This must be done with the system running in a known clean state. After the system has been reinitialized and is known to be in a clean state, copy ... files back.

"To put the system in a clean state, power off the system.

"Boot the system from a known clean floppy disk that is write protected.

DR. TIGNER IS NOT BUYING WIN95

After reporting that Joyce had received a Computer Science degree, and correcting that to Philosophy, we asked how computers figured in the degree work, and how the degree affects future plans..

" I purchased a KayPro II with 64 K of RAM and a daisy wheel printer in 1983 because it was clear that computer power would be required for the amount of writing to be done. Lest we forget, 64K was hot stuff in 1983!

" In 1985 I upgraded to an 808XT and a 24 pin dot-matrix printer. Due to limited funds (I have put my daughter through college during the time I was completing my degree), I am still using this equipment. Despite the fact that my ability to access the Internet is quite limited, this equipment has served me well. Actually, all my literature searches were performed the old-fashioned way, either going through paper issues of *Philosophical Abstracts* or using Rutgers U.'s access to *Dialog*. My version of Microsoft Word ver. 4 contains 90 + printer drivers. The completed dissertation was formatted for a PostScript printer. Bill Powell assisted me with printing. When the document was pulled into MS Word 2 for Windows, it required almost no reformatting prior to printing on a laser printer.

"My area of specialization is applied ethics, including business, professional, medical, research, and environmental ethics. I am also particularly interested in social and political philosophy as well as feminist philosophy.

"I am now seeking a position in either university teaching or corporate ethics training and consulting.

"My dissertation is entitled " A Social Conception of Self-Deception.". In it I defend a particular conception of self-deception, i.e. self-deception is properly conceived as an erroneous belief held despite access to evidence to the contrary, and misinterpretation of evidence is due to the

influence of a motive. I then argue that, because motives are often adopted unreflectively from the social sphere, our roles in social institutions and organizational expectations which accompany those roles may lead us to adopt self-deceptive beliefs. In addition, certain types of organizational designs and expectations can foster and facilitate the maintenance of self-deceptive beliefs. This thesis is a direct challenge to the standard philosophical view that self-deceptive beliefs are the result of a single individual's failure to process information correctly due to the influence of emotion. This standard view assumes that emotion never has a cognitive role in the formation of beliefs, but, instead, always acts to undermine reason. I reject this view.

Dr. Tigner was DOS HUG's first Secretary and Newsletter Editor, later serving as Vice President and then President.

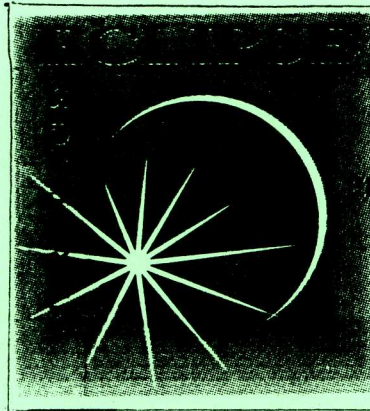
