Quicken - To Upgrade to Version 5 or Not?

This is just my assessment of some of the things I ran across.

I am a fairly big fan of Quicken. I use it at work to track rental properties for my boss. Its check register format makes it easy to record and print reports on income and expenses. I set up tenants as classes. I post rental checks to "rental income" in categories and then use the

classes to record which tenant made their payment. This makes it very easy to report the total rental income, or to do a breakdown of each individual tenant. If tenants pay late you can see it at a glance, and bam, late charges. It works well. The initial setup of the categories and classes is important, but later adjustments or additions are easy to add, delete or edit.

So if I'm so happy with it why upgrade? Why does the grass always look greener on the other side? Why is the other computer always better? I'm a big believer if it works, don't fix it. Which believe me, in my house with Joe always making changes, speeding up, upgrading, or having the computer give you little messages like "hold onto the chair," really is a challenge, why should I upgrade?

The only reason I even considered it was that I heard the reports now had handles that allowed you to shorten or lengthen the width of the columns. This was a feature that I knew Quick Books had, but not Quicken. Last year I even questioned their tech support, wanting to know when they would offer this feature. So here it is, all mine just for the asking. This sounds like a really stupid reason to get excited about upgrading, but I was happy. I could get the reports I wanted. I could show my boss all the info I had recorded in the memos without having lines cut off, or always running landscaping, or having columns that didn't apply to a certain report.

So when I didn't listen to Joe when he told me to wait till I did the year end posting before installing the new upgrade, I had to take a crash course on the upgrade and wrap up three companies data all in a matter of a few days. Sleep, what's that?

LOST ICONS OF THE NETHER WORLD

Version 5 has a new look, it opens to an improved Home Base. Quick Tabs let you quickly move between the areas of Quicken you use the most. Choose Options from the Edit menu, and then click General Click "Full Window Mode."

My first complaint was when using the split to post more than one entry the program would no longer allow me to enter classes by a click on the icon bar. In Version 4, after you clicked on the splits the category and class buttons would still allow you to access them. On Version 5 the entire icon bar is grayed out. Sure if you enter a (/) after the category name and begin to type in the class, it will fill in the rest for you, but what if tenants have similar names. Sometimes you could be typing out the entire name before it's entered. I want my button back!!! I looked in help, I read the manual. I found somewhere in the book that if you press Ctrl + L you can then access the class list without typing the entire name. It's a good thing I can read because I went through four (4) tech support people and none of them knew why this feature was changed or how I could get around it without having to type the names. They're still in the dark, I wasn't about to tell them when I still had to pay my phone bill. Plus I want that feature back. One other problem I ran across was some of the reports I had created in Version 4 when converted over to 5, would still not allow me to customize the columns. If I really wanted them to include or delete certain columns I had to redesign them all over again.

I have Version 5.0d, running under WFWG. Joe says that it's a resource hog and "quickly" drains the system to 40% or less. Quicken is now up to Version 5.0e. They're sending me the patch. It's still not going to fix my problems, but hopefully it will take care of some of the things that I haven't even run



This item, found on almost the last page of *More Windows for Dummies*, is worth the price of the whole book. When an icon disappears from a program or application that you know perfectly well is there somewhere, choose Run from the File Menu in Program Manager. Type SETUP space / P in the Command line box, press Enter, and wait as long as it takes. Program Manager may reappear as an icon at the bottom. Click on it and all the groups and icons should be back where they belong. It worked for me. (ehs)

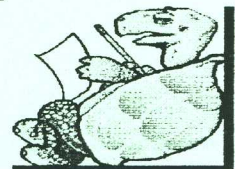

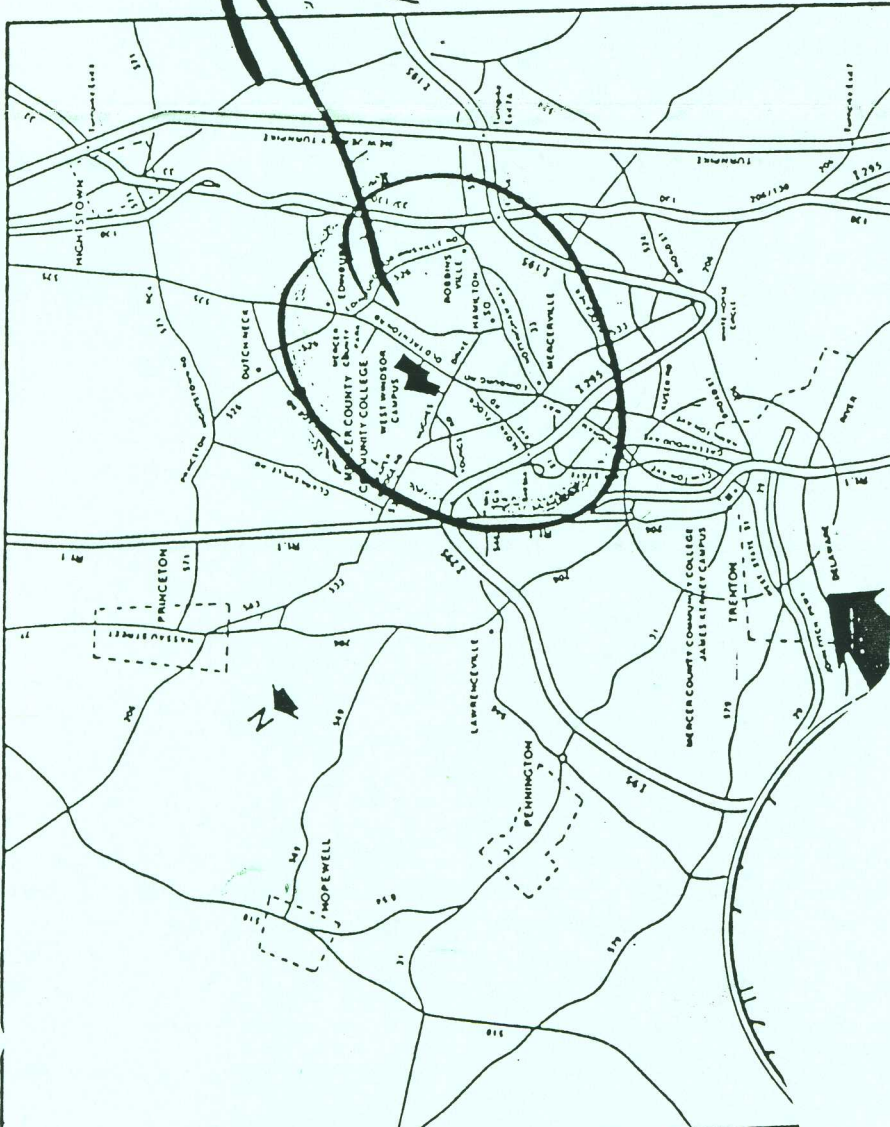

BEGINNERS' CORNER

Part 1: Selecting and moving files in File Manager. Suppose you want to move a file from A:\eggs to E:\chickens. Click on the E: box, the destination) highlight the Chickens file. Click on it. Then click on the A: box, highlight Eggs, hold the left button down and drag to the E box. You will see the little box attached to the mouse pointer as soon as you move the pointer away from the

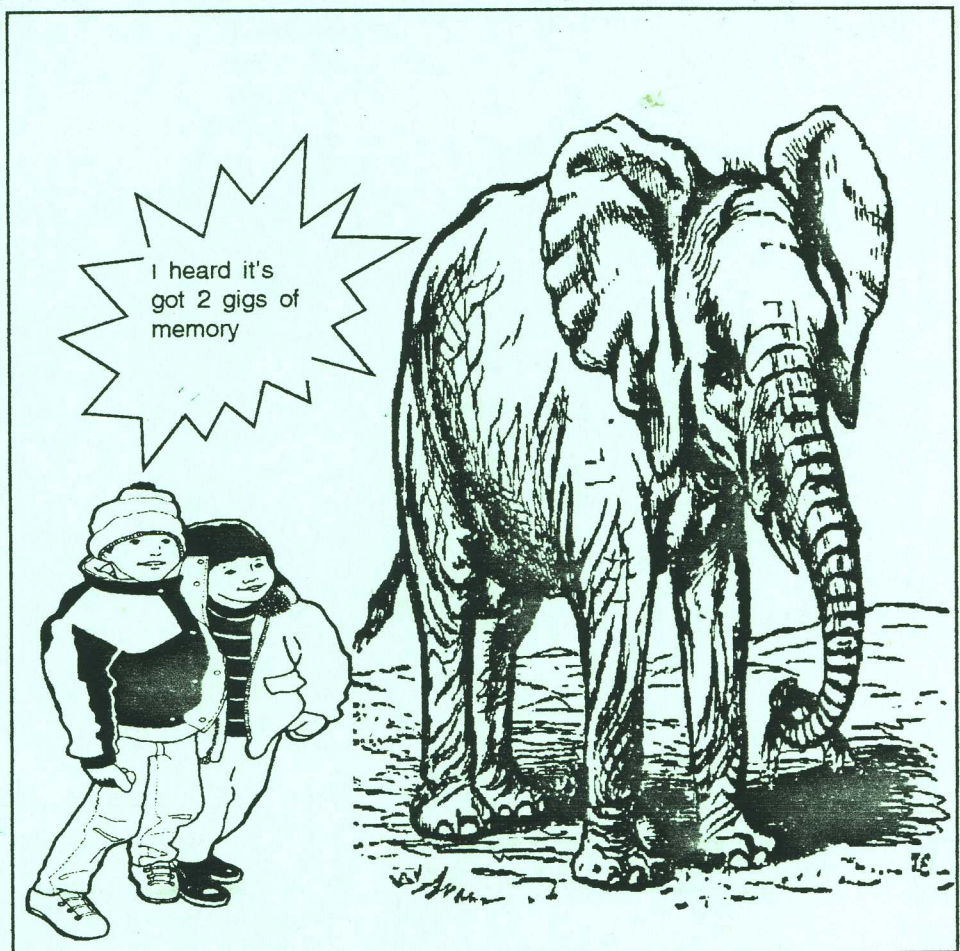
selected file on its way to the destination directory. A message asks if you are sure you want to copy, and tells the destination you have selected. Answer politely and the file will be copied.

Part 2: Still in File Manager: To copy several files that are not next to each other, hold **Control** down all the time you are selecting files here and there. To select a bunch of files that are all in a row, click on the first one, hold down **Shift**, then click on the last one you want, and they are all selected.

MORE MUDs

In case last month's MUD item was less than clear, here's more: A MUD is or MUDs are an outgrowth of the once very famous Dungeons and Dragons. MUDs = Multi-User Dungeons, also known as Dimensions, Dialogs, or Domains. Some MUDs are just friendly gatherings of dungeon denizens. As for MOOs, "Life in the MUD is still evolving. KEN GORDON SHOWS

The next Edison shows are on June 8, one day, and August 24, 25. There are shows in Wayne on March 16, 17 and May 4, and in Fort Washington, PA on March 23, 24, June 1, and August 17.

The February Edison show was too crowded to be fun, and table after table of the same titles of CD-ROM disks are not as tempting as the shareware displays used to be. I saw one sign for Win 95, one or two stacks of 3 1/2" disks, no 5 1/4's. The big seller seemed to be the Hewlett Packard 660 color printer which prints on two sides of the paper. There was a large supply of "adult" CD's. (This always strikes me as a misnomer.)

Battling the crowds at Edison when you already have a system you like and a

color printer waiting to be connected, is pretty much like going grocery shopping right after a big meal. My only purchase was one CD-ROM for \$12.00. It has 14,000 graphic files, nicely categorized, and a good viewer. Disks used to be a regular purchase, but they are just as cheap at Staples now, and easier to carry to the car. Staples' price for the HP 600C is the same as at the show. (ehs)

On Midnight Machine Works you can download a file called Newsgroups.zip, in a minute or so, that brings you a list of 11,500 Usenet Newsgroups, alphabetically arranged. A newsgroup is an Internet interest group, not a newspaper

It's worth a blank disk to practice and master zipping and unzipping.

**GPO ACCESS NOW FREE!
 GOVERNMENT INFORMATION
 AVAILABLE TO INTERNET/DIAL-IN
 USERS**

The U.S. Government Printing Office (GPO) announces free use of its award-winning GPO Access online service beginning December 1, 1995. All Internet and dial-in users can now receive electronically, at no charge, the Congressional Record, Federal Register, congressional bills, and a growing list of important government documents on the same day of publication.

"We believe the public should have timely access to vital information about the activities of their government without charge," says head of the GPO, Public Printer Michael F. DiMario. "This service is made possible through the congressional funding of the Federal Depository Library Program at a time when more and more citizens are receiving their information by computer."

The GPO Access service was created by an Act of Congress in 1993 and went online in June 1994. The service earned the 1994 Federal Technology Leadership Award and a 1995 James Madison Award sponsored by the Coalition on Government Information.

Until now, GPO Access has been free only to users on-site in some 600 of the Nation's nearly 1,400 Federal Depository Libraries and to remote users connecting through over 20 depository library "gateways." It was available to others on a subscription basis for a low fee. Under the

new program, the subscription fee has been dropped and refunds of unused portions will be sent to current subscribers.

DiMario emphasizes that depository libraries will continue as an essential link between GPO Access and the public. "Citizens lacking either computers or computer skills can visit a local depository for assistance," he explains.

The new system now gives equal and free access to those utilizing a depository library and to those who are linked already by dial-up or Internet connections to electronic information. As the Federal Depository Library Program becomes more electronic in nature, additional databases will be available through GPO Access. Since its creation in 1994, the number of databases offered online via GPO Access has increased from seven to more than two dozen.

Government databases can be reached via the Internet or by dial-in through a modem.

Internet users can access the databases with a World Wide Web browser through the Superintendent of Documents' home page at: http://www.access.gpo.gov/su_docs/ or with WAIS client software.

Internet users can also telnet to swais.access.gpo.gov; then login as guest.

Dial-in users should use a modem to call 202-512-1661; type swais and then login as guest.

In more than 20 States, users with modems can connect to GPO Access through depository library "gateways" with a local phone call. Listings of depository libraries and "gateways" can be found on the Superintendent of Documents' home page.

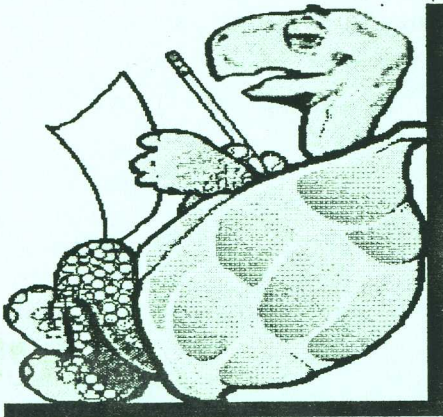

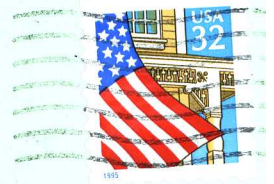
