I clicked on NetScape and waited, and my reward was a new message: Application Error Abnormal Program Termination. The cure for this was to turn on the modem and try again.

PC Computing Magazine listed 1000 free downloads from the Web so I typed http://www.pccomputing.com and nothing happened. The cure for this was to press Enter. I found the download site, but learned I need Navigator 2.x. The message said to read Help in the NetScape menu to find out what version I have. This involved leaving NetScape so I did it later and learned that I have version 1.1. Now I have to learn where to download a new version and what to do with it after I get it.

So I typed a new address
http://www.whowhere.com, which
promises to tell me email addresses of
anyone anywhere, but depends entirely
on voluntary listings from people who
happen to call that site. The person I
wanted to find had not listed himself. I

listed me, but without a phone number. You can list just your name and email address.

Then I typed http://users.aol.com/jimgamble/ an address published in the latest Puppeteers of America Journal. Jim is one of the few people in the world who makes a good living as a full time puppeteer. I tried to print his graphic of a circus puppet show poster (File menu - print) and all went well, but slowly, until the print window said 75% stalled, and the bottom line said document done. Actually it started saying "stalled" around 45%, but went on to 75. 75% of the picture printed fine. On screen 75% showed, 25% was a black rectangle. I was caller 1051 on this site.

Then I typed http://www.eat.com. Internet World magazine called this one of the most popular pages. It's by Ragu. it offers hundreds of recipes, but I couldn't print one. It offers coupons, but when you sign up for them you get email (very soon) that offers to let you know when to look for coupons in your local paper. I don't need help with that so I sent a reply following their directions for unsubscribing, but NetScape said the address was no good. Another sign up was a T-shirt offer for \$3.00 and 2 POP labels. The website lets you print the order form. This printed perfectly. In a few minutes I had 9 emails from Ragu. They also offer Italian lessons, with the words in English and Italian. If you click on an underlined word, the Professor is supposed to say the word for you. However, before he does this you need to download Realaudio. So I started that, but then it said I had to download an external viewer. So I tried to do that, and it appeared to finish but then said it was unable to launch the viewer. Both of these items suggested that I needed a higher version of NetScape and at least a 386 machine. At least there were no complaints about memory. So I had to do my Italian lesson by myself, which is OK

if you have already studied the pronunciation at the New School. Anyway, the Ragu site was fun and I would look at it again.

I typed http://www.toyota.com to learn more about my new RAV4. It offered me a CD ROM and mostly said Toyota cars are wonderful. Under "Affordability" it listed a price for each RAV model. The one I bought had a sticker price \$6000. higher than the web page listing - not a great marketing idea. I didn't see an update notice here, as I did on some site.

http://.www.lib.ncsu.edu/stacks/alexinde x.html This was supposed to give me an index of books available on line, but the message was that this index has been withdrawn because it was out of date.


