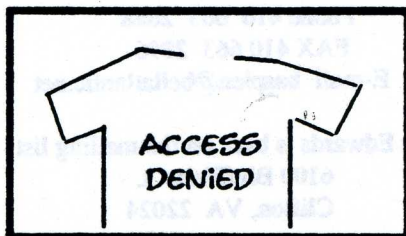

Determining Win32s version

You can determine which version of Win32s you have in one of two ways:

- Check the WIN32S.INI file in your Windows system directory.
- If you are running Windows for Workgroups, select the WIN32S16.DLL file from the Windows system directory in File Manager. Then from the File menu, choose Properties. The Version line contains the major version and the build number.

Removing Win32s

To remove the Win32s, do the following:

1. Remove the following line from the [386Enh] section in the SYSTEM.INI file:

```
device=<WINDOWS>\<SYSTEM>\win32
s\w32s.386
```

where <WINDOWS> and <SYSTEM> are where the Windows and System directories are, respectively.

2. Remove winmm16.dll from the following line from the [BOOT] section in the SYSTEM.INI file:

```
drivers=mmsystem.dll winmm16.dll
```

3. Delete the following files from the <WINDOWS>\<SYSTEM> subdirectory:

```
W32SYS.DLL
WIN32S16.DLL
WIN32S.INI
```

4. Delete all the files in the <WINDOWS>\<SYSTEM>\WIN32S subdirectory.

Then delete the subdirectory itself.

5. Restart Windows.

Obtaining Win32s

Here's how you can obtain the Win32s version 1.20, which Microsoft refers to as application note PW1118:

To obtain this Application Note (number PW1118) and the files

included with it, download PW1118.EXE, a self-extracting file, from the Microsoft Software Library (MSL) on the following services:

- CompuServe
 - GO MSL
 - Search for PW1118.EXE
 - Display results and download
- Microsoft Download Service (MSDL)
 - Dial (206) 936-6735 to connect to MSDL
 - Download PW1118.EXE
- Internet (anonymous FTP)
 - ftp ftp.microsoft.com
 - Change to the \SOFTLIB\MSLFILES directory
 - Get PW1118.EXE



QuarterDeck CleanSweep - a review by Richard Wilkins

QuarterDeck CleanSweep has four primary functions. You can un-install programs, un-install unused system components, find unused or obsolete files, and find duplicate files.

Using the Uninstall feature of CleanSweep is a real quick way to remove a program and it's components from your system. The only problem I had in using this feature was when CleanSweep asked me if I wanted to remove .dll files from the Windows System directory. Sometimes those .dll files are used by another windows program installed on your system. So, I believe it's possible to remove a .dll file associated with the program you are

deleting, only to discover later that the very same .dll is needed by a program you didn't delete. However, CleanSweep does allow you to save deletions in special back-up files just in case you do delete something you end up needing later.

The System option allows you to delete various system components that you may not realize are taking up a lot of space on your hard drive. For example, I just selected the Unused Fonts tab and discovered that I currently have 15,433,728 bytes worth of font styles installed on my drive! Since the only fonts I use often are Times New Roman and a couple of others, I could save a lot of disk space by uninstalling the unnecessary fonts. Other system file options include display drivers, wallpapers, screensavers, help files, dos .pif files, and various document and system files.

The Find Unused option finds files which are obsolete or unused. It can locate backup files temporary files, archive files, lost cluster files, help files, graphic files, and files that match a user defined criteria. Just for kicks, I did a search of my system's archive files. I found 26,303,067 bytes worth of Zip files. These files have just been sitting around on my drive taking up space.

The Find Duplicates feature does what the name suggests. It finds files that you have more than one of and lets you delete the ones you don't want.

Again, it was the .dll files that gave me pause when it came time to decide which ones I would get rid of. Still, it was easy to find 655,360 bytes worth of files that I knew I didn't need duplicates of. After letting CleanSweep make a backup of the files, I saved 409,600 bytes.

I found this program to be very useful in cleaning up my hard drive. If nothing else, using CleanSweep will

give you heightened awareness of what's on your drive.

Just when I thought I was finished writing this review, I discovered a feature of **Cleansweep** I'd missed. The feature is called **SuperLinks**. It keeps track of what components are used by which files, especially DLLs! When Windows is started up, a small program goes out and updates the SuperLinks. This allows you to know which DLLs are used by which programs. This feature has just made me very happy...

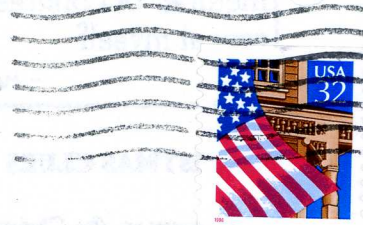
