## NEXT AND BEYOND

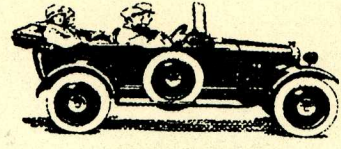

There was again a discussion of incorporation and our legal status. Jac Carroll has done a lot of paperwork toward tax free status.

Rick Williams offered Magic Cap software, an easy e-mail organizer, in exchange for a review. We look forward to reading about it.

There were no new questions in the Q&A box. Jim Russ handled the ways and means tickets, and the secretary benefited as well as the club.

## THE PROGRAM

Dan Titus, President of TRAVROUTE, took us on a great trip Door to Door. No hard sell, no glitches, just a smooth presentation of a product that sold itself. Road Trips Door to Door needs Win95 or NT, so many of us had to just be awed and envious. Another TRAVROUTE program, City to City, will run on Win 3.1, but Door to Door is the one we all want.

After you enter your starting point, your destination, and all the stops you want to make on the way, the program tells you total miles, and time, and turn by turn directions. You also enter preference for scenic route or speed, and choices such as bridges or ferries. Dan pointed out that this is the only mapping program which gives you both highway and street directions. As to travel time, you can enter whatever speed you expect to travel, and get the total time based on that speed.
