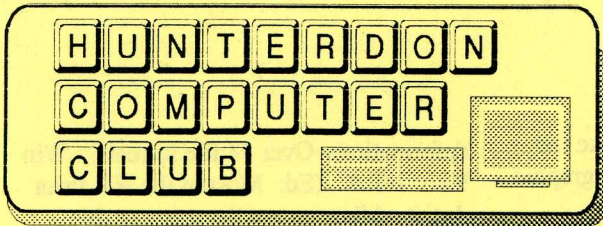

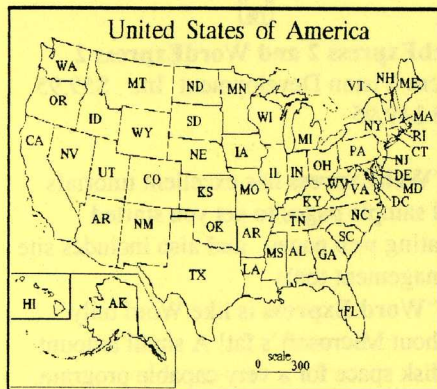
The October meeting will be on Saturday the 18th at HMC.

THE SEPTEMBER MEETING

HCC held its regular meeting on September 20, 1997, at HMC. Guests and new members welcomed included Elizabeth Linden, her son, Martin Holm, Judi Casper, Brian Hamm, and Barbara

Kenyon from The Institute for Human Potential, Inc.

John Warsinski took care of fund raising. Paul Stonesifer handled the raffle tickets, and brought a bundle of things from the National Education Computing Conference in Seattle. Joe Burger designed and donated a new club banner.

President Rick Williams called the meeting to order at 9:30 AM. About 40 people were present. He explained that he will not seek a new term as president because he has agreed to produce a 400 page book for his 50th reunion at Amherst, and also feels that a MAC user should perhaps not be leading a group so devoted to PC's.

Vice-President Joe Burger, claiming to have been MAC -free for 792 days, gave his usual succinct report on the mass of developments in the computer industry. He noted that Bill Gates is losing some importance, having "missed the Internet by about 2 years" and that Microsoft will continue strong with or without him.

Jim Russ commented on news reports about Moore's Law, which predicted obsolescence for new computers every 18 months. Intel is announcing new chip design "altering the basic physics of chip design in a way that engineers and computer scientists once thought impossible". This "could bring a fourfold increase in ...recording and playback time". It could also reduce obsolescence to nine months. (ref John Markoff in the NY Times- clipping from the Sec's archives)

Treasurer Jac Carroll was absent stringing network wires elsewhere.

Secretary Stewart displayed pictures by Bill Woodall. He printed the same picture twice, on the same printer, using plain paper for one and photo print paper for the other. The difference was impressive. So was the price of the photo paper, - over a dollar a sheet.

Another picture was from Don Columbo, showing his classroom computer lab in BenSalem Middle School. He explained that the students are using computers to learn subject matter and get directions for lab exercises, not "learning computers." (Ed. : This parallels an old school saying - we learn to read up to 4th grade, then we read to learn.) Don was very enthusiastic about the success of the program with children from many countries and ordinary home situations. The program is set up by Advanced Training Systems Inc. Don suggested they might be a good speaker source.

THE PROGRAM

.. Joe Burger kindly and fortunately gave your editor a handout with details on the programs he showed us. .



After explaining that you can count on higher standards if you get shareware from members of ASP, Joe started with **WinZip**, now at version 6.2, with 6.3 in Beta, made for Win95, NT or 3.1 \$29. from Nico-Mak Computing, Inc. WinZip unzips files downloaded from the Internet. It also lets you view and print files. Joe showed examples of compression,

showing that a tightly written .exe file can't be compressed much but a graphic file with lots of white space can .



WinZip history from the handout: "The most common compression algorithms depend on the fact that bit patterns tend to be repeated over and over. It may be more efficient to use "shorthand" meaning " the three letters that occurred 27 letters ago" than to reuse the word *the*. The mother of all repeating pattern algorithms is Lempel-Ziv and a variant on it called Lempel-Ziv Welch. (LZ abd LZW) These algorithms are behind ZIP and GIF files and Drive Space.

The computer scientists who pioneered the technology in the late 70's were Abraham Lempel and Jacob Ziv, two Israeli academics. Terry Welch worked for one of the companies that merged to become Unisys, ergo Unisys lays claim to a patent for LZW. There have been huge arguments over how much of the technology was already in LZ and so in the public domain.Unisys recently demanded royalties on all the gif files on the WWW.

"An algorithm is any special method of solving certain mathematical problems, e.g. finding the least common denominator.

"**WinZip** offers context sensitive help (press F1), a Brief Tutorial, or a WinZip Tutor for 95, with step by step instructions.

UPGRADE?

: Last year, I upgraded my GirlFriend 5.0 to GirlFriend 5.1, which : installs itself as "Fiancee 1.0". Recently, I upgraded Fiancee 1.0 to : Wife 1.0 and it's a real memory hog. It has taken up all my space, and : Wife 1.0 must be running before I can do ANYTHING.

: It is also spawning Child Processes which are further consuming system : resources. Some applications, such as PokerNight 10.3, BeerBash 2.5, : and PubNight 7.0 are no longer able to run in the system at all.

: Additional plug-ins were automatically installed, such as : Mother-In-Law 55.8, and there is no uninstall feature for these : plug-ins. No mention of these behaviors was discussed in the brochures : or documentation, although other users have reported similar problems.

: Because of this, some users that I know have decided to avoid the : headaches associated with these

upgrades, and simply move from : Girlfriend 5.0 to Girlfriend 6.0. Unfortunately, this is not without : peril as well, as all traces of Girlfriend 5.0 must be removed from : the system before attempting installation of 6.0.

: Even then, Girlfriend 6.0 will repeatedly run system checks (usually : in the background, and often late at night when the system is asleep) : to find evidence of previous versions. To cap it off, Girlfriend 6.0 : apparently has a nag feature reminding about the advantages of : upgrading to Wife 1.0.

: However, I do like some of the features that you are planning to : include in the upcoming Girlfriend 6.1 release:

- * A "Don't remind me again" button
- * Minimize button
- * Shutdown feature
- * An install shield feature so that Girlfriend can be completely : uninstalled if necessary (so you don't lose cache and other objects)

: Unfortunately, since I've already upgraded to Wife 1.0, I don't think : I will be able to take advantage of any of these new features, unless : you decide to include them in the next Mistress release. But, of : course, there is a whole raft of problems associated with the use of : Mistress 1.0 and Wife 1.0 on the same system -- most notably are : system conflicts and continual disk thrashing, which starts shortly : after Wife 1.0 detects Mistress 1.0. Interestingly enough, all : versions of PersonalLawyer still work fine. Finally, Wife 1.0 : apparently deletes all MSMoney files before uninstalling itself;

: following that, Mistress 1.1 will refuse to install, claiming : insufficient resources.

: I personally find all these new tools and conflicts to be too : confusing and time consuming. I'm sticking with Dog 1.0b3. It slobbers : and chews up the paper, but all in all these bugs are tolerable. It is : simple to operate and we get along fine.

LET WIN95 MONITOR MODEM PERFORMANCE

sent by Don Columbo

" You can use the Win95 System Monitor to measure your modem's average file-transfer speed. First, you need to figure out what your download speed should be. Your modem's speed is rated in kilobits per second (28.8 Kkbps, for example.) but Win 95 measures download speed in kilobytes per second.... Converting from kilobits to kilobytes is simple. Just divide the modem's rated

Monitor has been installed. Open the Add/Remove Programs icon in Control Panel. Choose Wwin Setup tab, then double click the Accessories entry. System Monitor should have a check mark.

Next, turn on report logging for your modem. Double click the Modems icon in Control Panel. Select the modem from the list of installed modems, then click Properties. On your modem's Connection tab, click the Advanced button. Make sure there's a check mark next to Record a log file.

Now you're ready to measure your modem's performance. Log on to the Internet as usual. Once connected, start the System Monitor (Start/Programs/Accessories/System Tools) and select "Add Item" from the edit menu. Choose your modem from the "Add Items" list (your modem won't appear unless you're actually on line). choose "bytes read". System Monitor will now display a real-time gauge showing the modem's download speed."

Don says this works well.

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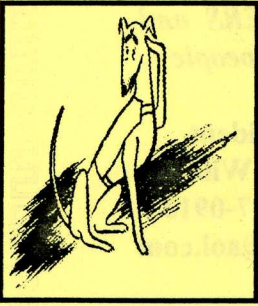
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and YOU

Need a close-circuit video camera? Any PC camera user can create video files of events that occur over extended periods--and you won't have to give up half your hard drive space to do it. Instructions for Microsoft's New TV Dinner Product

from Paul Glattstein

You must first remove the plastic cover. By doing so you agree to accept and honor Microsoft rights to all TV dinners.

You may not give anyone else a bite of your dinner (which would constitute an infringement of Microsoft's rights). You may, however, let others smell and look at your dinner and are encouraged to tell them how good it is.

If you have a PC microwave oven, insert the dinner into the oven. Set the oven using these keystrokes:
`\mstv.dinn.//08.5min@@50%heat//`

Enter

```
ms//start.cook_dindin/yummy\\yum~yum:
-)gohot#cookme.
```

If you have a Mac oven, insert the dinner and press start. The oven will set itself and cook the dinner.

If you have a Unix oven, insert the dinner, enter the ingredients of the dinner (found on the package label), the weight of the dinner, and the desired level of cooking and press start. The oven will calculate the time and heat and cook the diner exactly to your specification.

Be forewarned that Microsoft dinners may crash, in which case your oven must be restarted. This is a simple procedure. Remove the dinner from the oven and enter
`ms.nodamn.good/tryagain\again\again.crap.`
 This process may have to be repeated. Try unplugging the microwave and then doing a cold reboot. If this doesn't work, contact your hardware vendor.

Many users have reported that the dinner tray is far too big, larger than the dinner itself, having many useless compartments, most of which are empty. These are for future menu items. If the tray is too large to fit in your oven you will need to upgrade your equipment.

Dinners are only available from registered outlets, and only the chicken variety is currently produced. If you want another variety, call Microsoft Help and

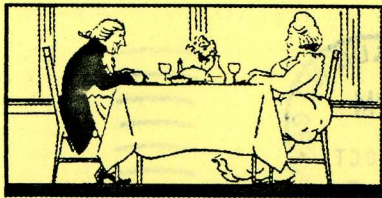
they will explain that you really don't want another variety. Microsoft Chicken is all you really need.

Microsoft has disclosed plans to discontinue all smaller versions of their chicken dinners. Future releases will only be in the larger family size.

Excess chicken may be stored for future use, but must be saved only in Microsoft approved packaging.

Microsoft promises a dessert with every dinner after '98. However, that version has yet to be released. Users have permission to get thrilled in advance.

Microsoft dinners may be incompatible with other dinners in the freezer, causing your freezer to self-defrost. This is a feature, not a bug. Your freezer probably should have been defrosted anyway

Microsoft Publisher Tip of the Week

FOUND ART

If you've searched high and low through the Clip Art Gallery and still can't find a graphic you like, don't despair. Instead, see if what you're looking for is part of a border. To search available borders, start by drawing a very small rectangle with the rectangle drawing tool. Then choose Format|BorderArt (in Publisher 2) or Format|Border|BorderArt tab (in Publisher 3 and 97). Scroll through the list until you find something you like.

If you give the border a large point size (try 70 points), you'll get a single image in your little rectangle, rather than multiple images in a border shape.

NT News Note from Paul Glattstein

Apparently NT5 is due to be released this week. Microsoft has pushed back the deploy date for Windows 98 to the second quarter of 98. They have also indicated that they will not continue with this line after Windows 98. After that it's all NT.

Windows Logo Keys

On new keyboards, there are three new keys. Paul Glattstein has forwarded this guide to using them. The Windows Logo Keys are the ones with the

picture on the left hand and right sides of the spacebar between the CTRL and ALT keys. The Application Logo Key is the one on the right hand side between the Windows Logo Key and the CTRL key.

Using the Windows Logo Key:

To open the Start Menu, press one of the Windows Logo Keys

To minimize all open windows, press a Windows Logo Key and the M simultaneously

To maximize all windows, press a Windows Logo Key, Shift and M simultaneously

To open Explorer, press a Windows Logo Key and E simultaneously

To open the Run Dialog Box, press a Windows Logo Key and R simultaneously

To move through the applications programs in the task bar press a Windows Logo Key and Tab simultaneously. When you are on the program you want press Enter.

To open the Find Files Dialog Box, press a Windows Logo Key and F simultaneously.

To open the System Properties Dialog Box, press a Windows Logo Key and BREAK simultaneously

Pressing both Windows Logo Keys at the same time opens up the System Manager

Using the Application Logo Key:

The application key brings up the most commonly used menu options for the program in which it is depressed (usually cut, copy, paste and a couple of others) try it and see.

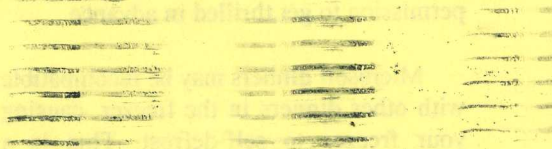
